District Finances for 2021

I want to thank all the units and their treasurers who supported the district in making their Pledge to Mission for 2021. I was concerned until the end of the year that we would fall short by several thousand dollars—but you stepped up, <u>Praise the Lord</u>. It's been a rough couple of years, and I pray that you can

all manage to hang on, maybe even find some new members to help, or merge some activities with other neighbor units. Cheyenne has had some success at that.

We had pledged \$18,500 as a District and I received and sent on to Conference Treasurer \$18,799.30 in the Five Levels of Giving: Pledge to Mission, Special Mission Recognition, Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, and World Thank Offering. I also passed on designated giving: Call to Prayer and Self Denial, A Brighter Future for Children, UMCOR, Redbird Mission, Warren Village and Legacy 150 for \$2,173.43.

We had 15 active units and received contributions from 12 of those units. Seven units paid all of their Pledge to Mission: Casper Christ, Cheyenne First, Cheyenne Grace, Douglas, Laramie, Pine Bluffs, Rock Springs. The Star Awards this year for giving to all five levels of giving will be presented at our annual meeting in June. A 5 Star to Casper First and a 6 Star for also increasing their pledge in 2021 to Cheyenne First and Pine Bluffs.

P.S. We are looking for a new District Treasurer. I have served my 6-year limit. The job can be done by a non-bookkeeper, attention to detail is the biggest asset. She will be elected in June but keep the books starting next January. The job is easier if you have some computer experience (a computer comes with the job) and have an internet and printer. There is some of the work that requires Quick Books. I am more than happy to give some in-person training during this year. There will be a few Zoom meetings of both the District Officers and the Conference Finance Committee. The 2 Conference Treasurers I have worked with have been very good at helping solve problems. #### Cheyenne First Stitch in Time group

For several years, we have had a group of UMW ladies who like to sew. At first, we just listed a person to contact for church projects (like altar vestments) as needed. Then we remodeled our building and needed some sheer curtains in 2 large meeting rooms in the basement. We gathered in about 10 ladies who came to the church for about 3 days to measure, sew and hang the curtains. The next day there was some catastrophe with the heating system that flooded the basement. The insurance company got in a disaster team which proceeded to take down our "contaminated" curtains and throw them away! So--we started over.

We tried three times to get a group that would meet on a monthly basis. In 2019 we had a few machines loaned or donated to us and asked for a Sunday school room to store our machines and supplies. We brought up our stash of donated materials and organized it in the room.

We were requested to keep a local nursing home supplied with cheerful pocketed bags to hang on walkers. We delivered 20 in March 2019. We continued making the walker bags and delivered 205 to 9 agencies in town in September 2020. We are still working to deliver 50 more requests.

Our unit had begun planning to host the 2020 Conference Annual Meeting. For Ubuntu projects we wanted one activity for those who didn't want to travel to another site. One of our members was a member of Zonta Club, and they have a project of making draw string bags and filing them with clothing and hygiene items to donate to the hospital for abuse victims. We decided to start making those bags

and make plans to turn it into an Ubuntu project at the meeting. We had one of the Zonta Hope Bag ladies (also a UMW member at Cheyenne Grace) come join us in the planning. We would ask all the ladies who attended annual meeting to make donations for the bag contents. The Ubuntu team would join us in sewing and get a little lesson on how they could set up this type of project in their community. Both 2020 and 2021 annual meetings were held online only, but we decided to make a bunch of bags to donate anyway. In October 2020 we presented over 100 bags to the Zonta hospital project and about 50 smaller bags with a stuffed toy to the police department for children's crisis.

Next project, place mats with a pocket to hold napkin and silverware. These were taken in April 2021 to Meals on Wheels so that each client could have one to keep at home. We took 200 first and have taken 50 more a couple of times as their clients are increasing.

In August 2021 we delivered many tiny soft pillows for the cancer center to give patients to protect the area where ports are installed. So far, we have delivered about 200.

Next project is lap blankets that fit in wheelchairs. We're giving to a new memory care facility first.
